Hello Dear Friends

I pray you have had a good week. We give thanks for our AMP last week and for our Parish Council, Wardens, and Synod Reps.

As you read this, I will be in the UK having conducted the Funeral service of my Father-in-law, for whom I give thanks. I should return this coming Wednesday.

Our readings this week are a reminder that we all have a great need to live in the light.

Our Numbers reading tells us of further journeys of the Israelites and the threat of snake bites!!!!!

Here in Australia, a giant rainbow serpent is associated with the creation of life. The Rainbow snake, in aboriginal spirituality, is said to inhabit deep water wells and is understood to be the personification of fertility, of rain and of abundance. Snakes are a very positive image in many cultures, symbolising healing, and life. However, in Judaism and Christianity snakes are almost always symbols of evil.

In the Garden of Eden, it was the serpent that tricked Eve into disobeying God and eating the forbidden fruit thus bringing death as a result. In the Book of Revelation, the devil is called "The Ancient Serpent". Then in our Old Testament Reading for today, because the people spoke against God and

Moses, God sends into the Jewish camp poisonous snakes and we are told, "many were bitten, and many died."

So, snakes, for us, have a very negative image - they symbolise evil and sin.

The Israelites were wandering in the desert because they refused to trust God's leading. They had been led right to the border of the Promised Land, but they were afraid to enter. They didn't believe God would give them victory over the land and so they wandered in the desert. They remained in darkness and their sin was to criticise God. They refused to trust God's love and care. They forgot the miracles God had done for them. In short, they were so focused on themselves and what they thought was best that they began to grumble and criticise God.

And the consequences were immediate. Numbers tells us, "The Lord sent poisonous snakes among the people" and these snakes' bit many of the people and they died. In other words, many people died because of the sins they were committing.

But then we are told that the people recognised that they were sinning. They called to God and said in verse 7, "We have sinned by speaking against God... take the snakes from among us." And God in his mercy heard the people and provided a way for them to be saved from death. to enter into the light. God's answer to the problem of their sin was

rather odd. God told Moses to make a bronze snake and put it on a pole. "Elevate it," God said, "So that it can be seen by all the people in the camp." God told them, "When anyone is bitten by a snake, have them look at the snake and they will live." And sure enough, those who trusted in God were saved from death by looking at the bronze snake that Moses elevated on a pole in the midst of them.

A snake in this story is a symbol of sin. But!! God didn't remove the snakes from the camp. Why? Because the snakes being a symbol of sin is not for God to remove. We are the ones who choose to sin and it is our choice to continue sinning or to stop sinning.

But even if the snake is removed, the snake bites (being a symbol of consequences of sin) remained with the Israelites. They were still bitten – they still felt the poison of sin. But what God did provide was salvation from death. He allowed the Israelites who trusted God to avoid perishing as a result of sin.

The solution God provided was, I think, a challenge to acknowledge sin our lives. God tells Moses to make a bronze snake and place it on a wooden pole. Those who look at it, who hold it up before their eyes – will live. Come to the light and face sin – and we will be healed and forgiven.

John the author of the gospel author applies this well-known event to Jesus' own lifting up on the cross. John has Jesus say, "As Moses lifted up the snake on a pole in the desert, so the Son of Man must be lifted up. Then," said Jesus, "Everyone who believes in him will have eternal life."

So, as we continue our journey through Lent to the cross on Good Friday, we are reminded that Jesus came into the world to become the real salvation of people - to be raised between heaven and earth on a cross. And just like God promised salvation to those who looked at the bronze snake on the pole – Jesus promises eternal life to those who trust in God and look to the cross for their salvation and light.

We know from experience: anyone who does wrong hates the light and avoids it. But those who do good: love the light and come out into it. How many of our deeds are done in the light? How many of them could bare the scrutiny of the light?

We must accept that there is darkness in our lives and in our world. We have to recognise that darkness: and learn how to bring it into the light. It is futile to wait for the darkness to go away. So often we wish it would. But we have to accept that it is here and will always be here. Therefore, it's up to us to step into the light by doing the right thing.

People who know the love and joy of God do not deny the darkness, but they choose not to live in it. They trust in the light that shines in the darkness and know that a little light can dispel a lot of darkness. And the light of Christ is such that no darkness can overpower it. If we do the right thing, then the light will shine for us.

Mission of The Month for March is Church Missionary Society

The following detail can be found on the Church Missionary Society website - https://cms.org.au/

In 1799, The Church Missionary Society (CMS -UK) was founded in England by a small group (Tanzania). of Anglican evangelicals with a passion for worldwide gospel outreach. They included John Newton, who wrote Amazing Grace, and William Wilberforce, who was a leader in abolishing the slave trade in England. CMS-UK turned its attention to Australia working amongst Aboriginal people a primary focus at the time. A CMS-UK outpost was set up in Sydney in 1825 and the first missionaries arrived from England shortly afterwards to serve in western NSW. CMS associations were set up around Australia and the first Australian CMS missionary. Helen Philips, sailed for Ceylon (Sri Lanka) in 1892. In 1916, the Australian CMS associations came together to form the Church Missionary

Association of Australia and later changed their name to the Church Missionary Society of Australia (CMS). CMS had sent missionaries from Australia to many countries by this time, including China, India, Palestine and Iran. By 1927, CMS had a particular interest in North Australia and Tanganyika (Tanzania).

More than 1500 Australians have served with CMS

The stated objectives of the CMS Australia are To proclaim the gospel of Christ throughout the world, in fellowship with the local Churches:

- · To send missionaries overseas and to Northern Australia;
- · To deepen Christian commitment to Evangelism;
- · To support CMS missionaries by prayer, giving and pastoral care;
- · To engage in cross culturalism;
- · To educate the Australian Church in its responsibilities to this Mission.

Mothering Sunday

This Sunday the 10th March 2024, being the fourth Sunday in Lent, is Mothering Sunday.

Centuries ago it was considered important for people to return to their home church or 'mother' church once a year. So each year in the middle of Lent, everyone would visit their 'mother' church - the main church or cathedral of the area. Scripturally, the idea of returning to one's Mother Church comes from Galatians 4:26 which speaks of Jerusalem as the mother of us all.

Now most of us will not travel back to our Mother Churches wherever that might be in the world, so The Dean of our Cathedral, asks please that on Mothering Sunday we all say a prayer for the Mother Church of our Diocese, St. Boniface Cathedral.
